

Notes to Contributors

Asian Review welcomes submission of articles dealing with various aspects of Asia including politics, economics, society, culture, and foreign affairs. All contributions are subject to a fully anonymous reviewing process.

Submissions should be sent to The Editor, Asian Review, Institute of Asian Studies, Chulalongkorn University, Bangkok 10330, Thailand, ias@chula.ac.th, on diskette or CD, in Microsoft Word format, accompanied by a printout, and by a letter giving the author's name, address, email address, and telephone numbers.

Papers should be no more than 6,000 words including footnotes and bibliography. Include an abstract of around 150 words, and a short bio-data of 3 to 5 lines. Tables, figures, and maps should be saved in separate files and not embedded in the text.

Referencing may use the in-text style, or endnotes. For the in-text style, the citation should be in the form: (Sukhumbhand, 1989: 23). Include a full bibliography of works cited, using the following formatting:

In the case of endnotes, the initial mention of any work should use the following formatting:
